Restoration in Store

Preservation of the 1877 National Historic Landmark Vessel, the Governor Stone presents unique challenges, as she is a working, sailing on the water historical artifact. The continuous exposure to the elements. wind, sun, rain and corrosive salt water require continuous maintenance to preserve the condition of the vessel.

In spite of the best efforts of volunteer members of the Friends of the Governor Stone some aspects of the vessel have deteriorated to the point requiring removal from the water where significant repairs can be made.

In 2012 the Florida Division of Historical Resources selected the Governor Stone to receive a 2014 Viva Florida 500 Small Matching Historical Preservation Grant. Funds are expected to be awarded in July of 2013 and will be matched by donations and in kind

services from supporters including Bay County Boat Yard, Eastern Shipbuilding, Kurt Voss of Historic Ships and Boats and numerous volunteers.

The single biggest task of the restoration will be repairs to the original keel of the vessel to address damage from ship worms in the interior of the centerboard slot, leaks at the centerboard and garboard joints and at rudderpost and driveshaft fittings. While the boat is out of the water skilled craftsmen will replace damaged planks below the waterline and under the rub rails.

Needed repairs to deteriorating deck structures present the opportunity to replace the hatch covers, cabin and steering gear box with structures that are historically accurate and are built with traditional methods using like-kind materials.

Planned funds are additionally available to replace the sails, sail covers and running rigging with modern maintainable materials that more closely resemble the appearance of original lines, sails and blocks.

Get Involved

Further improvements of the vessel are dependent on the volunteer commitment and the funds raised prior to the commencement of the restoration.

Member volunteers are needed to help organize, plan and implement the restoration; to assist with historic research, locate materials, identify craft resources, provide logistics, participate in additional fundraising, document and promote the restoration activity, provide hands on assistance including skilled and apprentice woodworking, sanding, refinishing and caulking. Illustrious Past – An Apology of Sorts

This from the licensing and Coast Guard records of the *Governor Stone*:

Thomas Burns received the boat from his father in 1922 and owned her until 1940. At some point after her last license in 1929 she sank. Thomas sold the sunken vessel to Isaac Rhea. Mr. Rhea had her raised, rebuilt and put

to use as a daysailer. When he applied to have her registered there was some confusion, and some difficulty finding Mr. Burns. The assistant collector of District 19, Office of the Collector found it necessary



to write the following to the director of the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation in Washington D.C.

"This office acknowledges Bureau letter of the 8th instant, relative to the ownership of the gasoline screw GOVERNOR STONE (85508). If this office advised the Bureau that Mr. Burns was dead, it has done him a great injustice, for he is very much alive. On February 19, 1940, he sold the vessel to I. T. Rhea, at this port, account property and trade changed. Being under 16 gross tons and used exclusively for pleasure, it was awarded 19 E 434 on February 27, 1940. The surrender license was forwarded the Bureau on day surrendered."

This still leaves a mystery as to when she sank. Was it 1929, as she was not licensed after that, though her license was not surrendered until 1940? Was she under water for 10 years before she was salvaged? No major storms hit the area in those years, though 1932 and 39 had some damage from storms. We continue to seek the rest of the story.
